Mayor Marlowe read the proclamation by title only.

14 Vox Pop for Items Not Listed on the Agenda or Listed on Consent Agenda

Mayor Marlowe opened the floor for public comment. Tim McClain, 5443 Main Street, NPR came forward to congratulate Councilman Altman and Councilwoman Mothershead on winning the election. He spoke about the timing of the traffic lights along Main Street and how the food trucks do not fit within the parking spaces along Main Street. Shinikki Whiting, 5755 Indiana Ave., NPR came forward to apologize to City Manager Manns, Chief Bogart and Mayor Marlowe. She also thanked Councilman Murphy. George Romagnoli, 6235 Florida Ave., NPR came forward to congratulate Councilman Altman and Councilwoman Mothershead. He also spoke about home ownership and housing standards within the city. He suggested using ARPA funds for home loans. Don House, 2104 Beach Trail, Indian Rocks Beach, came forward to compliment the way Main Street is looking and nice to see that we have term limits. He stated that he had an issue with pulling permits for several properties he owns. Kenny Parr, 5319 Locust Place, NPR, came forward to speak about parking on Lemon. Mark George, 5308 Lemon Street, NPR came forward to speak about her new guitar business and stated there is a need for parking. Nichole Hine, 5138 Lemon Street, NPR came forward to speak about the parking on Lemon. With no one else coming forward for public comment, Mayor Marlowe closed Vox Pop. Councilman Altman stated he has spoken a few times during communications about the parking on Lemon. He would like to add it as an agenda item for further discussion. Mayor Marlowe thanked Mr. Romagnoli for his housing suggestions.

Motion was made to accept the Consent Agenda.

- a Second Reading, Ordinance No. 2022-2259: Amendments to Chronic Nuisance Ordinance

City Attorney Driscoll read the proposed ordinance by title only. City Manager Manns introduced the item to Council. She stated that the purpose of this agenda item was to conduct a second and final

reading of an ordinance to amend the City's existing Chronic Nuisance Ordinance to include drug overdoses as an activity constituting grounds for abatement. This ordinance was enacted as a tool for code enforcement and police officers to use to address properties where criminal activities reoccur affecting public health, safety and welfare issues in the City. When the initial list of "qualifying" nuisance/criminal activities was initially created, drug overdoses were overlooked. These type incidents do occur and require police and fire department services. This amendment will provide the City with a means to require proactive preventive actions to be taken by the property owner/manager. Upon opening the floor to public comment, Don House, 2104 Beach Trail, Indian Rocks Beach came forward and stated he was in support of the ordinance amendment. With no one else coming forward Mayor Marlowe returned the floor to Council. Motion was made to approve the ordinance upon its second and final reading.

b Second Reading, Ordinance No. 2022-2258: Animal-Drawn Vehicle Ordinance

City Attorney Driscoll read the proposed ordinance by title only. Upon opening the floor to public comment, David Wallis, 12641 Valimar Rd., NPR, came forward to read from the comments he previously submitted. Chopper Davis, 6110 Florida Ave., NPR came forward and stated he agreed with Mr. Wallis' comments. He suggested allowing the operating hours to extend past ten o'clock for summer months and special events. With no one else coming forward Mayor Marlowe returned the floor to Council. Councilman Altman stated the property is to stay with the operator and not turned into the city. Mayor Marlowe asked City Attorney Driscoll for clarification on Section 23-171 and City Attorney Driscoll stated it is based on circumstance and he would not recommend supporting Mr. Wallis' comments that it be changed. City Manager Manns stated that traffic on Main Street is conflicted. This vendor is relying on Main Street to transport customers around town. She stated it is staff's recommendation that the animal-drawn vehicles can cross Main Street but not operate on Main Street. She stated that staff can conduct a traffic study to see if it would be appropriate to allow for the operation on Main Street. Councilman Altman asked about the prohibited streets and City Attorney Driscoll stated City Manager Manns was requesting to add Main Street to the prohibited list. Mayor Marlowe stated he would support amending the hours to 11:00 p.m. Motion was made to approve the ordinance as presented with the addition of prohibiting operation on Main Street with the exception of the section between Bank Street and River Road and extending hours until 11:00 p.m.

a Resolution No. 2022-06: Establishing a Fee Schedule for Animal-Drawn Vehicles

City Attorney Driscoll read the proposed resolution by title only. City Manager Manns introduced the item to Council. She stated that the purpose of this agenda item was to adopt a resolution which will establish a fee schedule for animal-drawn vehicles. She stated that this agenda item is a companion piece to the second reading of Ordinance No. 2022-2258 regarding animal-drawn vehicles. This resolution establishes an application fee of \$100.00 per vehicle and an annual permit fee of \$100.00 for those vendors who wish to operate animal-drawn vehicles within the city. Upon opening the floor to public comment, no one came forward therefore Mayor Marlowe returned the floor to Council. Motion was made to approve the item as presented.

Motion made by Mike Peters and seconded by Kelly Mothershead. The Motion Passed. 5-0. Ayes: Altman, Marlowe, Mothershead, Murphy, Peters

b 2022 WWTP Surface Water Discharge Administrative Order Compliance Task Order No. 14 - Engineering Services

City Manager Manns introduced Public Works Director Robert Rivera who then presented the item to Council. He stated that the purpose of this agenda item was to approve the 2022 WWTP Surface Water Discharge Administrative Order Compliance Task Order No. 14 from Stroud Engineering Consultants, Inc for engineering services in the amount not to exceed \$58,750. This item ties together several compliance items. The City's existing plant permit expires November 6, 2022. The City can apply for exemptions. Mr. Rivera then introduced Brent Heath from Stroud Engineering who then made a presentation to Council. Mr. Heath began his presentation by providing a history of the WWTF. Mr. Heath then highlighted the items in the Administrative Order. Mr. Heath then highlighted major task items which included a Copper Testing Analysis Plan, WWTF Bench-Scale Testing and a Summary Report. Deputy Mayor Peters asked about the copper levels and Mr. Heath said the reporting was not consistent. Mr. Rivera stated we are already discharging water with levels lower than the bayou. Upon opening the floor to public comment, no one came forward therefore Mayor Marlowe returned the floor to Council. Motion was made to approve the item as presented.

c 2022 Cotee River Bike Fest Alcohol Beverage Special Event

City Manager Manns introduced the item to Council. She stated that the purpose of this agenda item was to approve the ABSEP for the 2022 Cotee River Bike Fest. The organizers wish to sell beer on Friday, October 7th from 5-11pm, Saturday, October 8th from 12-11pm, and Sunday, October 9th from 1-5pm. Upon opening the floor to public comment, no one came forward therefore Mayor Marlowe returned the floor to Council. Motion was made to approve the item as presented.

Motion made by Mike Peters and seconded by Pete Altman. The Motion Passed. 5-0. Ayes: Altman, Marlowe, Mothershead, Murphy, Peters

d Consideration of Appointments to Intergovernmental Committees

Mayor Marlowe asked if anyone wanted to be removed from their current committee. Councilman Altman suggested that Deputy Mayor Peters take over the TDC. He stated he would like to stay on the TBRPC. Councilman Murphy stated he would like to stay on the MPO. Motion was made by Councilman Altman to make the representatives as follows:

e Recreation & Aquatics Center Annual Summer Membership Sale

City Manager Manns introduced Parks and Recreation Director Kevin Adams who then presented the item to Council. He stated that the purpose of this agenda item was to approve the Parks and Recreation Department to initiate the annual Summer Membership Sale at the Recreation and Aquatics Center. If approved, the 2022 Summer Membership would be available to purchase from May 1st - June 1st. The total discount would be 20%. Upon opening the floor to public comment, no one came forward therefore Mayor Marlowe returned the floor to Council. Motion was made to approve the item as presented.

Motion made by Matt Murphy and seconded by Kelly Mothershead. The Motion Passed. 5-0. Ayes: Altman, Marlowe, Mothershead, Murphy, Peters

f Resolution No. 2022-07: Genetic Information Discrimination Policy

City Attorney Driscoll read the proposed resolution by title only. City Manager Manns introduced the item to Council. She stated that the purpose of this agenda item was to adopt a resolution which establishes a Genetic Information Discrimination Policy for the City's workforce policy as a condition of participation in the Community Development Block Grant Programs and Projects. As Council may recall, at your meeting on July 8, 2021, there were several resolutions passed in regards to the administration of the Community Development Block Grant Program. In order to comply with the program requirements and also as a condition of receiving CDBG funds, the City is required to adopt a Genetic Information Discrimination Policy. The policy, in short, prohibits discrimination based on genetic information, establishes guidelines for acquiring and maintaining genetic information, and provides for the confidentiality of genetic information. Upon opening the floor to public comment, no one came forward therefore Mayor Marlowe returned the floor to Council. Motion was made to approve the item as presented.

Motion made by Mike Peters and seconded by Kelly Mothershead. The Motion Passed. 5-0. Ayes: Altman, Marlowe, Mothershead, Murphy, Peters

18 Communications

Mayor Marlowe told Councilwoman Mothershead about the SLC lunch this Friday and that City Clerk Meyers would register her for the event. Councilman Murphy welcomed Councilwoman Mothershead and congratulated Deputy Mayor Peters. Councilman Murphy gave an update on the MPO priority project list. Councilman Altman stated he is looking forward to the Penny for Pasco work session discussion. He stated his preference would be for the City of NPR and City of PR to work together on some microtransit or water taxi options. He stated he would like to look at the gateway for a boat ramp. Deputy Mayor Peters congratulated Councilman Altman and Councilwoman Mothershead on their victories. Deputy Mayor Peters commended City Clerk Meyers for her hard work. He stated that he would like to see the underpass project but would put some pressure on putting a trail down Grand. He stated that we have the improvement and reconstruction of the Grand Blvd. Bridge that will be an important part of our trail system. Deputy Mayor Peters thanked the rest of Council for his appointment as Deputy Mayor. Councilwoman Mothershead thanked all of her supporters. Councilman Murphy stated as a follow up to Deputy Mayor Peters' comments, it was a good idea to look at Grand Blvd. He also thanked Councilman Altman on his re-election. City Manager Manns commended City Clerk Meyers for her hard work and stated that she completely fulfills those ideals. She introduced new Economic Development Director Barbara Carr. Mayor Marlowe stated People Places is starting up their Talk About Town series again and it is an opportunity to learn about what it takes to plan a community. He encouraged everyone who is available to attend.

Subject: This is what I said tonight

The homeownership rate in the city has dropped from 68% in 2010 to 53% in 2020. While price is a big issue, another issue is the condition of our houses. A large percentage of first time homebuyers use FHA programs to buy their homes. FHA, and most bank lending, requires that homes be brought up to a certain code standard. Many homes in this city do not meet that standard. When that happens, those houses are sold to cash buyers who, many times, convert those homes to rental homes. They may or may not bring the house up to code.

The County has excellent downpayment assistance programs, and we do not compete with that. What we can do is use American Rescue Plan funds to create a revolving loan fund to help sellers of homes bring those homes up to code. I see the city issuing 0% loans that would be due in one year or sale, with a deed restriction requiring that the homes being sold to new homeowners under 120% of the median income level (roughly \$88,000 for a family of 4). We have \$350,000 in Rescue Plan funds for purchasing foreclosed homes. You cannot compete with the private sector on that front. Lets amend the plan.

. I am offering to the city, to work with the city manager and the city attorney to create a program that would have minimal administrative costs to the city, I am not asking for a consultants fee, or any future profits from this program.. I am looking to increase the homeownership rate, and affordable housing in the city

ORDINANCE NO. 2022-2258

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEW PORT RICHEY. FLORIDA, **PROVIDING** AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE VII OF CHAPTER 23, OF THE NEW PORT RICHEY CODE ORDINANCES, PERTAINING TO HORSE DRAWN **VEHICLES**; **PROVIDING DEFINITIONS** TERMS; PROVIDING DESIGNATION AS ANIMAL-DRAWN **VEHICLES**; **PROVIDING** FOR FRANCHISE FEES OF 1% OF GROSS RECEIPTS FOR OPERATORS; PROVIDING FOR AREAS OF **OPERATION**; **PROVIDING** TREATMENT OF ANIMALS AND CAPACITY; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS, SEVERABILITY, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, horse-drawn vehicles are provided for in the City's Code of Ordinances;

WHEREAS, state law provides for animal-drawn vehicles and subjects them to the motor vehicle code;

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to encourage the use of animal-drawn vehicles in the City;

WHEREAS, an appropriate franchise fee should be collected from the operators of animal-drawn vehicles in the City;

WHEREAS, the City Council has found that there are certain streets within the City where the operation of such vehicles should be prohibited in the interest of public safety, because such streets are not conducive to the safe operation of animal-drawn vehicles due to excessive traffic and the use of emergency vehicles; and

WHEREAS, it is declared as a matter of legislative determination and public policy that the provisions and prohibitions herein are necessary in the public interest; and it is further declared that the provisions and prohibitions herein are in pursuance of and for the purpose of securing and promoting the public health, safety, welfare and quality of life in the City in accordance with the City's police powers.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF NEW PORT RICHEY, FLORIDA HEREBY ORDAINS:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> Chapter 23, Article VII of the Code of Ordinances, pertaining to horse-drawn vehicles and providing as follows, is hereby amended as follows (strikeout text is deleted and underlined text is added):

ARTICLE VII. ANIMALHORSE-DRAWN VEHICLES

Sec. 23-160. Title.

This article shall be known and cited as the <u>"New Port Richey Animal-Drawn Vehicle Ordinance" city's horse drawn vehicle ordinance</u>.

Sec. 23-161. Definitions.

As used in this article, the following words, terms and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them herein unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

City manager shall mean the City Manager of the City of New Port Richey, or his/her designee.

<u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> Horse-drawn vehicle shall mean any vehicle which is operated, pulled or propelled by a horse, pony, mule, or donkey which may be used for the transportation of passengers and which is operated within the corporate limits of the city for hire-provided that hay rides, and horse drawn vehicles operated in connection with special events without charge are excluded.

Operate or operation shall include operation by the owner or any agent of the owner or by any person with the owner's knowledge, consent, or permission, expressed or implied.

Owner shall include any person, individual, firm, partnership, corporation, company, or other business entity or any combination or association thereof.

Permit shall mean the grant of authority by the city to operate one (1) Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle in the public streets within the limited area of the city designated in the permit.

Sec. 23-162. Compliance with article and Florida Statutes required.

No <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle of any kind operated, pulled or propelled by any animal may shall be operated within the corporate limits of the city except for <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles</u> horse drawn vehicles operated and permitted in accordance with this article and with <u>F.S. eChapter</u> 316, <u>Florida Statutes</u>. The operation of <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles</u> horse drawn vehicles within and upon the public streets and property of the city shall be subject to the conditions, regulations, and restrictions set forth in this article and with <u>F.S. eChapter</u> 316, <u>Florida Statutes</u>. It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the business of operating an <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle in the city except in compliance with unless the provisions of this article and the aforesaid <u>Florida law chapter 316</u> have been complied with.

Sec. 23-163. Permit required; transfer; franchise fees.

- (a) It shall be unlawful to operate or cause to be operated any Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle upon the public streets and property of the city except where that vehicle has not-been authorized by issued a permit issued by the city and or upon which said permit has not been affixed thereto as provided for in this article. Said permit shall be issued provided by the city manager pursuant to this article, shall be affixed to the Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle in a manner prescribed by this article, and shall be nontransferable. No permit shall be required for an Animal-Drawn Vehicle authorized in accordance with a special event authorized by the City, so long as the same is operated in accordance with the approval for the special event.
- (b) The operation of each Animal-Drawn Vehicle permitted under this article shall be subject to the imposition of a franchise fee for the use of the public streets and property of the City in the operation thereof. The franchise fee shall be equal to one percent (1%) of the gross receipts from the operation of each Animal-Drawn Vehicle within the City, payable monthly to the City. Each Animal-Drawn Vehicle permit holder shall submit documentation of the gross receipts for each Animal-Drawn Vehicle operated within the City on a form provided by the City on a monthly basis, along with such additional documentation required by the city manager. Each permit holder shall maintain all records of revenue generated from each Animal-Drawn Vehicle operated in the City for a period of three (3) years, and all operations of the operator may be audited or subject to any review deemed necessary by the city manager from time to time to establish whether sufficient franchise fees have been paid to the City. Any required franchise fees not paid to the City within thirty (30) days of the last day of the month in which the revenue therefor was earned shall be subject to interest at the highest rate allowed by law. In any action to collect unpaid franchise fees due hereunder, the City shall be entitled to the collection of reasonable attorneys' fees incurred in the collection thereof.

Sec. 23-164. Application for permit; approval, denial of application; appeal; permit fee; lost, destroyed permits; renewal of permit.

- (a) Any person desiring to obtain a permit to operate an Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle in the city shall submit to the city manager, on a form provided by the city, a written application which shall contain the following information:
 - (1) The name, address, telephone number, and form of business of the applicant. If the applicant is a corporation it shall also state (i) the names, addresses, and occupations of its officers, directors, and major stockholders, (ii) the names and addresses of any parent or subsidiary companies, (iii) the date and place of incorporation, and (iv) if incorporated outside the state, whether or not it has qualified to do business within the state. If the applicant is a corporation controlled by another corporation, the names, addresses, and occupations of the officers, directors, and major stockholders of the controlling corporation shall also be stated. If the applicant is a partnership or other unincorporated association, (i) the names and addresses of each member,

- whether active or inactive, shall be set forth, (ii) and if one (1) or more partners or members are corporations, the names, addresses, and occupations of such corporations' officers, directors, and major stockholders shall also be stated.
- (2) The trade name, if any, under which the applicant proposes to do business.
- (3) A thorough description, including photographs of the proposed Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle business to be operated; the manner in which the applicant proposes to install, maintain, and operate the business; the proposed hours of operation; proposed location from which the business is to be operated; the proposed route or routes to be served or utilized, together with a map or maps describing the proposed routes; the number of Animal-Drawn Vehicles horse drawn vehicles to be operated under the proposed business; the type of animal to be used to draw any vehicle; the identification number, make, and model of vehicles to be used in the business, together with the safety and sanitation devices and methods to be employed.
- (4) A list of the persons who shall be driving the <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles</u> horse drawn vehicles, as well as a copy of the automobile driver's license for each owner and proposed driver of the vehicle.
- (5) A thorough description of the proposed manner and location in which the applicant proposes to feed, shelter, quarter and stable, and otherwise care for the animals to be used in the business, and the method to be used in transporting the animals within and without the city.
- (6) A schedule of proposed rates and charges to all classes of passengers.
- (7) A certificate of soundness for each animal that will be pulling a permitted vehicle issued by a veterinarian licensed in the state, finding such animal to be free from infectious disease, in good health, and fit for vehicle service under this article. Each animal shall thereafter be <u>re-inspected reinspected</u> at intervals of no more than six (6) months, and a certificate of soundness shall be issued by such veterinarian and filed with the city in order for such animal to remain in service. No animal shall be used to pull or propel an <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle</u> without such certificate of soundness certified and dated within any preceding six-month period.
- (8) An insurance certificate proving that the applicant has met the insurance requirements of this article.
- (9) A sworn statement acknowledging the applicant's familiarity with and eligibility under the provisions of this section and any rules and regulations promulgated hereunder, and the applicant's intention to abide by the same.
- (10) Any such supplementary information the city shall at any time request in order to reasonably determine whether the request for a permit should be granted.
- (11) An application fee as provided by city council.

- (12) A fully executed indemnity agreement in the form provided by the city manager providing for indemnification of the City for the operation of the Animal-Drawn Vehicle.
- (b) Upon receipt and acceptance of a complete application for a permit, the city manager shall forward copies of said application to the chief of police. The chief of police shall evaluate the this application for public health, safety, and welfare concerns as it pertains to his/her department, as well as to ensure that the proposed Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle shall be constructed and operated in accordance with Chapter F.S. ch. 316, Florida Statutes. If the applicant's plan for service meets with the chief's approval, he or she shall report said approval in writing to the city manager. If said plan or application does not meet the approval of the chief of police, he or she shall report disapproval to the city manager with reasons for disapproval listed in writing. Should the application be disapproved by either the chief of police or the city manager, the application for permit shall be denied, and no permit to operate Animal-Drawn Vehicles horse drawn vehicles shall be issued to the applicant.
- (c) Any applicant whose application for a permit has been denied may, within thirty (30) days after said denial, appeal to the city council by providing written notice of appeal to the city manager. In the event of the submittal of a timely written notice of appeal by the <u>applicant permittee</u>, the city manager shall schedule the appeal to be heard by the city council within sixty (60) days from receipt the notice of appeal by the city manager or as soon thereafter as possible. In the event an appeal is denied by the city council, or if the applicant fails to timely file an appeal, the applicant may not apply for an <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle permit for one (1) year from the time of original denial.
- (d) Once the application is approved by the chief of police and the city manager, the city manager shall issue a permit to the applicant upon payment of an amount for each permit which is to be set by resolution of the city council. Said permit shall be valid for one (1) year from the date of issuance.
- (e) In the event an owner desires to obtain more than one (1) permit at any given time, said owner shall_must-pay a separate fee for each permit. Each Animal-Drawn Vehicle have its own permit. Permits may not be transferred from one (1) Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle to another.
- (f) If a permit issued under this section is lost or destroyed, the permit holder may obtain a duplicate upon payment of a service charge as set by Rresolution of the city council.
- (g) All persons holding city <u>Animal Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle permits <u>shall must</u> maintain in active operation the vehicle for which the permit was issued. Any permit <u>issued for an Animal Drawn Vehicle or business</u> which remains dormant for more than ninety (90) days shall be declared void by the by the city manager.
- (h) Any person to whom a permit has been issued, under the provisions of this article, shall be entitled to renew such permit from year to year; provided, however, that such person shall fully comply with the provisions of this article and such other ordinances, rules, and regulations as shall be enacted or adopted from time to time by the city. A permit holder

shall apply for said renewal no later than fifteen (15) days prior to the expiration of the permit for which renewal is sought; provided further, renewal of said permit shall be issued by the city manager upon payment of the annual permit fee.

Sec. 23-165. Area of legal operation Adherence to plan submitted in application.

Permittees <u>shall</u> must adhere to the routes, rates, vehicle number, animals used, and design as specified in their application for permits. Any deviance from said application without the approval of the chief of police and the city manager shall be in violation of this article.

- (a) <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles may be operated on the public streets of the city, except U.S.</u> Highway 19 and on the prohibited streets set forth in this section.
- (b) Animal-Drawn Vehicles shall not be operated upon the following streets:
 - (1) Congress Street;
 - (2) Madison Street;
 - (3) Massachusetts Avenue;
 - (4) Marine Parkway from U.S. Highway 19 to Grand Boulevard;
 - (5) Grand Boulevard from Gulf Drive to Ridgewood Drive; and
 - (6) Trouble Creek Road.
- (c) Notwithstanding the prohibition of Animal-Drawn Vehicle operation on the streets designated in subsection (b) hereof, the operation of such vehicles to cross the prohibited streets set forth in subsection (b) is allowed at intersections of two streets where operation is not prohibited, so long as the two streets are directly aligned on each side of the prohibited street and the crossing is completed in the most expedient and direct manner, and such vehicles are permitted to use prohibited streets to access properties accessible only from a prohibited street, only to the extent necessary to access the nearest street where operation is not prohibited.

Sec. 23-166. Liability and indemnification.

- (a) A permittee shall pay, and by its acceptance of a permit specifically agrees to pay, any and all damages or penalties which the city may be legally required to pay as a result of the permittee's operation or maintenance of an <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle under this article, whether or not the acts or omissions complained of are authorized, allowed, or prohibited by the city.
- (b) A permittee shall also pay all expenses incurred by the city in defending itself with regard to any and all damages and penalties mentioned in subsection (a) above. These expenses shall include all out-of-pocket expenses, including a reasonable attorney's fee and the reasonable value of services rendered by any employee of the city.
- (c) The permittee shall maintain, throughout the term of the permit, liability insurance insuring the city and the permittee with regard to all damages mentioned in subsection (a)

above caused by the permittee or its agents, in the following minimum types and amounts:

- (1) Workers' and unemployment compensation insurance as provided by the laws of this state; and
- (2) One million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) combined single limit policy.
- (d) The insurance policies obtained by a permittee in compliance with this section shall be insured by a company or companies acceptable to the city and a current certificate or certificates of insurance, along with written evidence of payment of all required premiums, shall be filed and maintained with the city during the term of the permit. The policies shall name the city as an additional insured and shall contain a provision that written notice of cancellation or reduction in coverage of the policy shall be delivered by registered mail to the city at least thirty (30) days in advance of the effective date thereof.

Sec. 23-167. Compliance with traffic regulations; city manager rules.

- (a) A driver of an Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle and/or any permittee, having been issued a permit or permits under this article to engage in the business of operating Animal-Drawn Vehicles horse drawn vehicles, shall be subject to all traffic provisions of this code and all other ordinances, rules, and regulations now in effect in the city or the State of Florida and all traffic ordinances and rules and regulations which may pertain to the operation of Animal-Drawn Vehicles horse drawn vehicles, hereafter enacted or adopted by the city or the State of Florida, and such rules and regulations formulated and promulgated under authority of this article.
- (b) The city manager is hereby empowered to designate the location and extent of space for stands to be known as "Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle stands." No automobiles or other means of conveyance other than such vehicles for hire as defined in this article shall be permitted to use such "Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle stands" within the time as provided by the rules and regulations promulgated by the city manager.
- (c) The city manager is hereby authorized and directed to formulate and promulgate reasonable rules and regulation for the use of such "Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle stands" so as to ensure equality of opportunity between operators, and to prevent discrimination between "Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle stands" and to prevent unfair practices between the owners, operators, and drivers of such Animal-Drawn Vehicles horse drawn vehicles for hire.
- (d) The city manager is hereby authorized and directed to formulate and promulgate reasonable rules and regulations in an attempt to prevent the following related to <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles</u> horse drawn vehicles: (i) accidents with pedestrians and automobiles, (ii) hindrances of right-of-ways and traffic, (iii) inhumane treatment of animals used to pull the vehicle, and (iv) other rules and regulations related to public safety and welfare.
- (e) Notwithstanding the above, the following rules shall apply:

- (1) The driver of each <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle shall make water available to every horse, pony, mule, donkey, or other animal being used to pull or propel a vehicle at intervals not to exceed one (1) hour;
- (2) No <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle shall be permitted <u>at any time</u> to carry more <u>persons</u> than <u>the rated seating capacity of the vehicle</u>, and no single animal <u>shall pull a vehicle having more than ten (10) people, including four (4) passengers and two</u> drivers <u>and excluding small children held in the arms of an adult passenger, at any time</u>;
- (3) No <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle shall be permitted to operate in the city when the ambient air temperature is below thirty-two (32) degrees Fahrenheit or above ninety (90) degrees Fahrenheit, as determined by the <u>city manager chief of police</u>.
- (4) It is unlawful for any owner or driver of a <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle to <u>subject any animal used for the same to any cruel or harassing treatment or equipment of any kind use whips, bits or any other equipment which may cause injury to the animal pulling or propelling the vehicle;</u>
- (5) If any Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle business or operation, including any driver thereof, is cited with three (3) or more traffic violations or violations of this chapter within one (1) year, all permits issued to the business or operation shall be automatically revoked until the owner can show good cause as to why the permit should be reinstated. Any owner or permittee whose permit has been revoked under this subsection may, within thirty (30) days after the revocation, appeal in writing to the city manager, who shall schedule said appeal to be heard by the city council within sixty (60) days from the date of receipt thereof or as soon thereafter as possible; and
- (6) Nothing in this article, including the issuance of a permit for <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles</u> horse drawn vehicles, shall be interpreted as authorizing or allowing the stabling or keeping of horses, ponies, donkeys, mules, or other animals within the jurisdictional limits of the city;-
- (7) During each one (1) hour period in which an animal horse is used in the operation of an Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle, said animal horse shall be given at least ten (10) consecutive minutes of reasonable rest time consistent with the animal's workload; and per hour. The requisite ten (10) minute rest period may not be accumulated and may not be given back to back in consecutive hours. Said rest period shall not be given to a horse during the first or last twenty (20minutes of each calendar day in which it operates;
- (8) <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles Horse drawn vehicles</u> are only permitted to operate in the city during the hours of ten (10) o'clock a.m. to ten (10) o'clock p.m., seven (7) days per week; provided compliance with all other rules and regulations stated herein occurs.
- (9) Each permitted horse drawn vehicle shall be equipped with:

- At least one (1) lamp or lighting device displaying a white light visible from a
 distance of not less than one thousand (1,000) feet to the front of said vehicle;
 and
- b. Two (2) lamps displaying red light visible from a distance of not less than one thousand (1,000) feet to the rear of the vehicle;
- (10) Each permitted horse drawn vehicle shall have a triangular slow moving vehicle emblem (SMV) displayed on, and clearly visible from, the rear of the vehicle.

Sec. 23-168. Rates, charges and permit to be displayed; property left in vehicles.

- (a) Each permittee shall prominently display in each permittee's <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle</u> a card or sign which shall show the schedule of the rates and charges for the transportation services furnished by the permittee; the city permit number of such <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle</u> and the name and address of both the permittee and the driver of such vehicle; and the actual permit issued for said vehicle. Such card or sign shall be posted in a conspicuous place in such vehicle while it is in use as an <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle for hire</u>, so that it is clearly visible to all passengers in such vehicle. The permit for a vehicle shall be posted in a conspicuous place on <u>or in the rear or side of the outside of</u> the vehicle so that it is clearly visible as well. It shall be unlawful for any permittee, operator, agent, lessee, or driver of any <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle</u> to charge more than the rate so posted.
- (b) Any permittee or driver of an Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle who discovers any personal property which was lost or left therein by a passenger shall report the loss and deliver all of the property to the office of the permittee within the same day as discovery of the property. The driver's report shall include brief particulars to assist the company in identifying the owner of the property and the company shall make a conscientious effort to contact the owner of the property. A copy of the report shall also be submitted to the chief of police, no later than the next business day after discovery of the lost property. The company shall retain the property on behalf of the owner for at least six (6) months after the finding thereof.

Sec. 23-169. Sanitation.

All permittees shall comply with the following sanitation requirements:

- (1) All horses, mules, and other animals shall be equipped with adequate devices to prevent manure and other excrement from falling upon the streets of the city. Any excrement which should fall upon the streets of the city shall be removed immediately by, and at the expense of, the permittee. A permittee is prohibited from allowing manure or excrement to enter the city's storm sewer collection system.
- (2) All animal waste for disposal shall be promptly transported to sites or facilities legally empowered to accept it for treatment or disposal. The city reserves the right to approve or disapprove sites, taking into account routes within the city, and the rules

- and regulations of the governmental body having jurisdiction over said sites or facilities.
- (3) A permittee shall further comply with all applicable health and sanitation provisions of the Sanitary Code of Florida and all rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.

Sec. 23-170. Condition and inspection of <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles</u> horse-drawn vehicles.

- (a) Each Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle shall be kept in a safe and sanitary condition at all times. The city shall have the right to inspect or cause to be inspected any Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle as often as may be necessary for the purpose of ascertaining and causing to be corrected any unsafe or unsanitary conditions or any violations of this article or any other rule, regulation, ordinance, or law relating to the operation of such Animal-Drawn Vehicles horse drawn vehicles.
- (b) The city manager is hereby authorized to establish a fee, not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00), for each such inspection, and is further authorized to establish and promulgate rules and regulations and minimum standards for the inspection and condition of horse drawn vehicles.
- (c) If any <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle shall fail to pass such inspection, it shall be removed from service on the day of inspection, and shall remain out of service until it has passed inspection.
- (d) All <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicles</u> horse drawn vehicles used by a permittee shall have conspicuously displayed on the <u>exterior of the</u> vehicle the name of the permittee or the trade name under which such permittee operates. No commercial signs other than those required by this article shall be allowed on any <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle.

Sec. 23-171. Use of vehicle in perpetration of crimes prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any permittee or agent or employee of same, to willfully permit any horse drawn vehicle horse-drawn vehicle to be used in the perpetration of a crime.

Sec. 23-<u>1712</u>. Revocation of permits.

(a) Whenever there is reasonable cause to believe that a person holding a permit to operate an Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle has violated or is violating any provision of this article, the city manager may, upon written, certified notice of said violation to the permittee, suspend the permit or permits issued to such person until such time as the city manager determines that the violations are corrected. If said violation is not corrected within thirty (30) days the permits will be deemed to be automatically revoked. Any owner or permittee whose permit has been revoked under this subsection may, within thirty (30) days after the revocation, appeal in writing to the city manager, who shall schedule said appeal to be heard by the city council within sixty (60) days from the date of receipt thereof or as soon thereafter as possible,

(b) If the violation is of such grievous nature as to endanger the public health, safety, or welfare, the city manager shall <u>issue an bring the matter before the city council at a public hearing to request</u> immediate revocation of the permits.

Sec. 23-173. Revocation of permit by chief of police.

- (c) If, upon investigation, the chief of police finds that the holder of a permit has violated any provision of this article, or has been convicted of the following: animal cruelty, murder, kidnapping, aggravated battery, burglary, robbery, sexual battery, prostitution, exposure of sexual organs, lewd, lascivious, or indecent assault or act upon or in the presence of a child, any crime involving the sale of controlled substances as defined by F. S., sSection 893.03, Florida Statutes, manslaughter or negligent homicide resulting from the use of a motor vehicle or any crime involving moral turpitude, then the chief of police shall advise the city manager of such conviction and the city manager shall revoke the permit.
- (d) Any owner or permittee whose permit has been revoked under this subsection may, within thirty (30) days after the revocation, appeal in writing to the city manager, who shall schedule said appeal to be heard by the city council within sixty (60) days from the date of receipt thereof or as soon thereafter as possible.

Sec. 23-172174. Attending vehicle.

The owner or operator of the <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle shall attend the vehicle and the <u>associated horse</u>, or other animal, at all times when the vehicle is on or near <u>public</u> eity streets <u>or property</u>. The owner or operator shall be located within fifteen (15) feet <u>of from</u> such Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle, at all times.

Sec. 23-1753. Driving under the influence while intoxicated, etc.

Driving an Animal-Drawn Vehicle horse drawn vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs is unlawful. If any driver of any Animal-Drawn Vehicle vehicle mentioned herein is convicted of driving same while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs, the holder of the permit for of said horse drawn-vehicle shall automatically have his/her permit revoked for a period of one (1) year.

Sec. 23-176. Suspension of license.

The chief of police is given full power to suspend any permit provided herein if he determines that the operation of the permitted <u>Animal-Drawn Vehicle</u> horse drawn vehicle horse drawn vehicle would cause imminent danger to the public safety. The suspension shall be effective immediately upon notification of the owner or operator of the vehicle. Any owner or permittee whose permit has been suspended under this subsection may, within thirty (30) days after the suspension, appeal in writing to the city manager, who shall schedule said appeal to be heard by the city council within sixty (60) days from the date of receipt thereof or as soon thereafter as possible,

Sec. 23-177. Enforcement Penalties.

Violation of any provision of this chapter shall be deemed a civil infraction. Enforcement of this <u>article chapter</u> shall be the responsibility of the city's code enforcement officers and the members of the city police department. Enforcement of this <u>article chapter</u> shall be <u>pursuant to Pasco County Administrative Order Number 00-05</u>, and all subsequent amendments thereto, in accordance with <u>Chapter 2</u>, <u>Article VIII of the City Code</u>, or by any other method permitted by the City Code <u>for enforcement of violations of the City Code</u>, <u>including without limitation through the use of the city's code enforcement board or an injunctive or other action in circuit court</u>.

SECTION 2. Enforcement. The provisions of this Ordinance shall be enforced as otherwise provided in the Code of Ordinances.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> Conflict with Other Ordinances and Codes. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the City of New Port Richey, Florida, in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 4. Severability. If any provision or portion of this ordinance is declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be void, unconstitutional, or unenforceable, then all remaining provisions and portions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption as provided by law.

These are my responses, concerns, and professional input for your consideration as you review your options on this ordinance proposal.

Sec. 23-162. Compliance with article and Florida Statutes required.

(Request red lettered verbiage be inserted)

No commercially operated Animal-Drawn Vehicle of any kind shall be operated within the corporate limits of the city except for Animal-Drawn Vehicles operated and permitted in accordance with this article and with Chapter 316, Florida Statutes. The operation of Animal-Drawn Vehicles within and upon the public streets and property of the city shall be subject to the conditions, regulations, and restrictions set forth in this article and with Chapter 316, Florida Statutes. It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the business of operating an Animal-Drawn Vehicle in the city except in compliance with unless the provisions of this article and the aforesaid Florida law chapter 316 have been complied with.

Sec. 23-163. Permit required; transfer; franchise fees.

(Request red lettered verbiage be inserted)

(a) It shall be unlawful to operate or cause to be operated any commercially operated Animal-Drawn Vehicle upon the public streets and property of the city except where that vehicle has been authorized by a permit issued by the city and affixed thereto as provided for in this article. Said permit shall be issued by the city manager pursuant to this article, affixed to the Animal-Drawn Vehicle in a manner prescribed by this article, and nontransferable. No permit shall be required for an Animal-Drawn Vehicle authorized in accordance with a special event

Sec. 23-163. (b) "....on a form provided by the City..."

I would like to see this form. Is it the same form used for ARTICLE XIV Sec. 13-701?

Sec. 23-164. Application for permit; approval, denial of application; appeal; permit fee; lost, destroyed permits; renewal of permit.

(Request red lettered verbiage be inserted)

(a) Any person desiring to obtain a permit to operate an Animal-Drawn Vehicle for hire in the city shall submit to the city manager, on a

form provided by the city, a written application which shall contain the following information:

Sec. 23-168. Rates, charges and permit to be displayed; property left in vehicles.

1. (b) Any permittee or driver of an Animal-Drawn Vehicle who discovers any personal property which was lost or left therein by a passenger shall report the loss and deliver all of the property to the office of the permittee within the same day as discovery of the property. The driver's report shall include brief particulars to assist the company in identifying the owner of the property and the company shall make a conscientious effort to contact the owner of the property. A copy of the report shall also be submitted to the chief of police, no later than the next business day after discovery of the lost property. The company shall retain the property on behalf of the owner for at least six (6) months after the finding thereof.

This paragraph conflicts with itself. I recommend striking the verbiage (and deliver all of the property to the office of the permittee within the same day as discovery)

Sec. 23-171. Revocation of permits.

(Request red lettered verbiage be inserted)

(c) If, upon investigation, the chief of police finds that the holder of a permit has been convicted of the following: animal cruelty, murder, kidnapping, aggravated battery, burglary, robbery, sexual battery, prostitution, exposure of sexual organs, lewd, lascivious, or indecent assault or act upon or in the presence of a child, any crime involving the sale of controlled substances as defined by Section 893.03, Florida Statutes, manslaughter or negligent homicide resulting from the use of a motor vehicle or any crime involving moral turpitude, that is still under the jurisdiction of the court then the chief of police shall advise the city manager of such conviction and remaining court observation and the city manager shall revoke the permit.
